Statement of Faith KJ Norris, 2014

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I believe in One God, who is Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. Scripture often speaks of the actions of each "person" of the Trinity separately and so we also speak this way, yet they are One; this is a great and beautiful mystery. Although God can reveal God's self through nature and other means, the primary way God reveals is through the Holy Scriptures. In the hearing of the Old Testament, we encounter God as the One who created all things both visible and invisible, who is a covenantal God, who calls people by name, and who teaches people to delight in God's way. The Scriptures promise that one will come who will reveal the glory of the Lord and who will establish a new covenant.

This promise has been fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ. God was willing to humble God's self^x and come to earth to be revealed in a new and full way. xi While remaining fully God, in the incarnation the Word took on flesh, xii and became fully human. Xiii The Lord Jesus Christ brought healing, wholeness and freedom to countless individuals, preached the Good News of the Kingdom of God^{xiv} and lived a sinless life. xv Though unjustly condemned, xvi Jesus Christ willingly laid down his life^{xvii} and subjected himself to death on a cross. xviii For our sake Jesus took on sin, though he knew no sin.xix Humankind was created good by God and in the image of God,xx but humanity chose pride and disobedience and became subject to sin and death. xxi In Jesus' death on the cross, he took upon himself the judgment under which all people stand convicted and became the final sacrifice for our sins. xxiii Jesus died and was buried. On the third day, Jesus rose from the dead. In his resurrection, death itself was conquered. XXIV And after appearing to many, Jesus ascended into heaven and sovereignly reigns over all things with the Father and the Holy Spirit. xxv We stand in hope that the Lord Jesus Christ will come again to judge the living and the dead xxvi and to create a new heaven and earth wherein there will no longer be sin, suffering, and death. xxvii Until that time, we are called to pray for God's Kingdom to come on earth, xxviii to recognize that the Holy Spirit is at work now reconciling the world to God, xxix and to share God's message of reconciliation with the world in both word and deed. xxx

In the power of God the Holy Spirit, I stand in thankfulness that God has called me into His family through the reconciling work of Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit testifies to the work of Christ through the Church in the giving of the Sacraments. Baptism and Holy Communion are signs and seals of the promises of God upon our lives. xxxi In baptism, God makes known his claim upon us and his pledge to cleanse us from all sin. xxxii Children should be baptized into the family of God because just as God marked the children of Israel into his family through the sign of circumcision, so God teaches children of believers that they are a part of the covenant community through baptism. xxxiii I stand under the Reformed Tradition, believing that this call into the family of God has nothing to do with my own righteousness or choice, but that I am saved solely by the love of Jesus Christ to whom the Holy Spirit testifies; no one can earn God's mercy and no one can testify that Jesus is Lord unless the Holy Spirit reveals this truth to them. xxxiv In Holy Communion, we not only remember that Christ died for our salvation, but we are also bound to Christ in faith. xxxv Though the bread and juice do not physically change their chemical nature, xxxvi we believe that in a very real spiritual sense, they are the body and blood of Christ^{xxxvii} and through participation in the Sacraments, the Holy Spirit binds us to Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit also convicts us of our sin that we might repent and respond to God with obedience. xxxviii Being claimed by God, we have new life in Jesus Christ, and although we continue to sin, the Holy Spirit gives us grace to practice in holiness. **The Holy Spirit is the giver of good gifts who enables those who have been called into the family of God to serve the Lord in ways that are beyond their human capacity.xl All of Christ's disciples are called to "go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them...and teaching them,"xli and we acknowledge that the marks of the True Church are right preaching of the Word and administration of the Sacraments. xlii We stand in hopefulness for the day in which "at the name of Jesus every knee should bend...and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."xliii
